APRIL Meeting Minutes

President Al Kent called the April 12, 2011 meeting to order at 6:30 PM and announced the presence of a quorum. Directors present were: Cheryl Bolland, Laura Fulton, Cyndi Miller, Gary Bannister, and Marlene Deck. Megan Plain and Marge Roe were not in attendance. Manager Mary Seego and thirty-five residents were also in attendance.

President Al Kent asked the Board Members to introduce themselves and state what they are responsible for.

A motion was made to accept the agenda as presented. The motion carried. A motion was made, seconded and carried approving the minutes from the March, 2011 meeting with the following additions/corrections. Joan Machtemes presented the following for the March minutes: The March Meeting minutes of the PCA board are not a complete reflection of the concerns I voiced at that meeting. Although I did express my concern for the safety of my grandchildren, the main thrust of my comments that evening dealt with the adverse effect the placement of beehives would have on the value and the marketability of my property and that of my neighbors. I also expressed concern that this course of action was being discussed and suggested to the PCA Board for its approval without any attempt to contact the members of our association as a group or as individuals to garner our comments and input regarding action which directly affects us. I respectfully ask that the minutes of the March meeting be amended to reflect the complete range of my concerns which I expressed at that meeting. Motion carried.

COMMUNITY COMMENTS - Cliff Sisko introduced Harry Patterson, Beekeeper. Harry proceeded to give a 20 minute overview about bees, beekeeping, and the differences of bees and wasps with a

question and answer period afterward. The following residents had questions and comments for Mr. Patterson. Caryl Herwick, 783 Manor Hill Place asked what becomes of the honey from the bee hives. The Beekeeper will take it.

Patty Warsaw 777 Manor Hill Place asked if the people in the community want the beehives and if other locations in Prestbury been considered? She also asked how much honey the hives do produce, 35 to 50 pounds of actual honey. John Gee, 770 Manor Hill Place, Robbie Rabanus, 730 Manor Hill Place asked who will be the beekeeper? Harry Patterson will be the beekeeper.

Tom Ernst 725 Manor Hill Place and Fran Chapin 753 Manor Hill Place expressed concern about the potential problems with the animal life and bees in the field.

Jim Hofer, 45 Hillcrest Drive asked about the benefits to the residents and what is the liability if someone gets stung and has adverse reaction. Paul Herwick's, 783 Manor Hill Place concern was what happens if the beekeeper gets sick or cannot take care of the hives?

George Hessling, 735 Manor Hill Place, has concerns about his grandchildren as well. Tom Kopp 703 Manor Hill Place and Jim Miller 9 Green Hills Court spoke to what had been discussed. At the end of the discussion, a petition opposing the proposal to place beehives in the open area between Green Hills Court and Manor Hill Place was presented.

Al thanked the residents for attending the meeting to express their concerns.

PRESIDENT'S COMMENTS - With much regret, I accepted Tom Stefancic's resignation from the

Board. Tom was elected to the Board in January 2007. He resigned in June 2007 but served as a volunteer to the Director of Maintenance. He was re-elected in January 2008 and again in January 2011. Tom always served as a Co-director of Maintenance taking over responsibility for streetlights, a project that's more than 50% complete; oversaw road construction with a budget of \$150,000 to \$200,000 annually; oversaw the reconstruction of the tennis courts at Merrill New Road Park. Prestbury's courts meet the criteria of the United States Tennis Association.

Tom's biggest contribution was setting a goal to revitalize the Common according to the Master Plan, by taking the lead in obtaining engineering plans, construction bids, finding a way to fund the project and then convincing the Board to approve it.

On behalf of the Board and the Prestbury Community, I want to thank Tom for all the contributions he has made during his terms. He accomplished alot.

The Master Plan was conceived in 2002, and the first rendition was approved in December 2003, but wasn't complete at that time. The Master Plan was completed by Greg Martin of Martin Design in 2005 with final Board approval in January 2007. There is much excitement over the Commons Project, which is part of the Master Plan. The project will make many needed improvements and change the face of Prestbury. The old tennis courts will finally be demolished. Part of the area will become a parking lot, while the remainder will be naturalized landscape. The northeast parking lot will be renovated to maximize parking and then landscaped. The parking lot in front of the clubhouse has been completely redesigned. It will contain the required number of disabled parking spots, meeting ADA requirements. In the process, the large hump in the drive approaching the clubhouse will be eliminated. Anyone wishing to see the plans may do so by contacting Nicki at the office. The project will begin August 14 and be completed by the end of October.

Living in Prestbury is unique in many ways, not the least is in the environment. There are many beautiful homes sited on lots, having mature trees. In addition to all of the formal and semi-formal landscaping, Prestbury sits in a rustic setting. The abundant parks, open spaces, woods, and lakes make a very attractive environment for nature. Just a couple weeks ago, there were hundreds of white pelicans that spent a few days on the slough enroute to their summer residence. This has

become an annual event. A year ago, there was a visit by Sandhill Cranes to the wetlands at the outflow near Hanks Road. Last year it was discovered there was a resident otter in Lake Prestbury. Canadian Blue Herons have resided here for many years. There's a large number of deer that are here at least for the winter season. Some of the species aren't quite so welcome, such as the hundreds of carp in the lakes, the beavers and muskrats and the many, many Canadian Geese.



Last fall a new species, a wild turkey, arrived at Cedargate Circle and has spent the winter and spring making friends. The game warden was happy to hear about "Lucy's" whereabouts and stated she had lived

in other communities from time to time before moving on. Not knowing there was a pre-existing name and the species was female, she was given the name of Max. After some study, it was determined Max had to change her name to Maxine. She spends part of each day going from house to house tapping on doors with her foot and eating birdseed that has fallen from birdfeeders. At night, she roosts in a tree in the backyard of one of the neighbors.



Frequently, she flies onto a windowsill, peering in the window to see if there is any activity in there. As a very friendly, partly tame bird, she has won over the hearts of many of the neighbors as they enjoyed her visits and then watched her sashay away to the next house.

Justin VanVooren, Finance Director, Village of Sugar Grove sent an email stating a meeting will be called sometime between late April and June to discuss increases in water and sewer rates for the coming year. Bill Gain, Joe Golab and Herb Steinmetz, all past presidents, have agreed to be the committee representing Prestbury. All have served on a similar committee years ago for the same purpose, making them eminently qualified for the job.

The Conservation Foundation, in conjunction with Chicago Metropolitan Agency for Planning (CMAP), will be facilitating a watershed planning effort for the Blackberry Creek watershed. The meetings began last year. Prestbury is a stakeholder. The Maintenance Directors have attended some of the meetings and I've attended one. For many reasons, it's important to have a single representative that can attend most meetings. To this end, I've appointed George Hauser to be a permanent representative to this committee.

Finally, I will be taking on the responsibilities of Director of Maintenance with Marge Roe. Seven years ago, when I was appointed to the Board, I was the sole Director of Maintenance and initially didn't have a co-director. In addition to Marge, Cliff Sisko has volunteered to assist.

As spring approaches, the weather warms and activities gear up, I'm anticipating a very enjoyable and productive year for our community.

MANAGEMENT REPORT - The financial report for March will be given to Gary for review as well as the delinquency report.

There were four closings that occurred in March.

Bids were solicited on diffuser and compressor maintenance for comparison to Integrated Lakes Management proposals.

Kane County Sheriff's security reports were submitted for March.

A landscape walk was conducted on March 29, 2011 with Jake from Cornerstone. A list of material/recommendations will be forwarded to Nicki.

Mary followed up on the legality of Sugar Grove's ability to force annexation. Our attorney responded as follows: There is nothing improper regarding the requirement for Sugar Grove to require owners to be annexed into the village prior to the construction of their homes. This requirement may be for several different reasons including the use of public utilities within the Village. The issue of annexation

is separate from the maintenance of the streets. The issue of whether streets are maintained by the Village is dependent upon whether the streets can be dedicated to the village. This is dependent upon several factors including the width of the street and whether there is sufficient access to the streets.

PCA On-Site Manager Report - The tennis court gate code has been changed. Contact the PCA office for the current code. Residents must present the 4 digit identification number from your Prestbury picture ID card.

The pool will open for the season on Memorial Day. Residents must present their Prestbury Picture Identification Card to enter.

The Prestbury Garage Sale is scheduled for May 14, 2011. All registration forms and the \$8.00 fee must be turned in by May 6th, in an envelope marked PCA garage sale.

The craft show scheduled for April 30th, 2011 in the Cheshire Clubhouse has been canceled due to lack of participation.

Yard waste pick-up began April 6, 2011. Yard waste bags must be used. Brush and tree trimmings must be bundled and securely tied with twine or string not to exceed 4 feet in length, 2 feet in diameter and 50-pounds in weight. Individual branches contained in a bundle shall not exceed 4 inches in diameter. Neither garbage nor waste pick-up can be placed on curbs prior to 5:00 pm on the evening preceding pick-up.

If you need a replacement recycle bin, contact the PCA office.

Report all street light outages to the PCA office.

Boat registration must be completed by June 1, 2011. The fee is \$10.00. June 2nd to July 1st, the fee is \$25.00. After July 15, if not registered, the boats will disappear.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Architectural Standards – No report

Clubhouse & Office Building – The Clubhouse Committee met on April 11, 2011 and recommends that the Security Deposit posted when reserving the clubhouse be increased to \$150.00. The

Committee did feel that the current cleaning fee of \$100.00 should remain the same. A new key system has been installed on the front door. It was more expensive for the initial installation but the cost of rekeying will be less. The back door, by the kitchen, door handle was broken and a new one has been installed. Reminder to anyone using the Cheshire Club – please do not drive on the pavers at the entrance.

Long Range Planning – No Report

Maintenance –

Landscaping: Cornerstone Partners Horticultural Services is the new landscape service for this year. Spring cleanup began on March 30, 2011. As a new company, there may be areas that are missed. If this happens, be sure to call the office and Nicki will follow up with the contractor.

The area between Green Hills Court and Manor Hill Place is a designated open area. For many years, the land was untended, so it became a harbor for weeds, including large numbers of Canadian Thistle and Crown Vetch. None of the trees growing in the space were planted but came up as volunteers – all are “weed” trees such as Cottonwood and Box Elder.

This past fall the area was mowed for the first time. The open area is being turned into a restored prairie and was drill seeded with native flowers and sedges. Many of the “weed” trees were removed and eleven oaks were planted. Eventually all of the “weed” trees will be replaced with native trees. Integrated Lakes Managements, Inc. (ILM), will perform some maintenance for weed control, using weed specific herbicide.

Lakes: A contract was signed with ILM. This is year one of a ten-year plan approved by the Board at an earlier meeting. ILM has been managing the shoreline of Lake Prestbury since 2007 and has made tremendous progress in controlling weeds, promoting native plant growth and shoreline stabilization.

The naturalization of the wetland area, bordering Hankes Road at the outflow, will be expanded this year.

Kritter Getters has begun trapping muskrats and to date has gotten nine, mostly from Lake Blackberry. Traps will be put into Lake Prestbury the first week in April.

Bioswales: Creating a bioswale is the process of planting native plants in an area where water flows to decrease erosion, filter chemicals from runoff and thereby improve the quality of the water. A pilot project was proposed to Greg Huggins, Sugar Grove Township Road Commissioner. The area proposed are ditches, part of the Sugar Grove Township road right away, across from Hankes Park, where the water flows under the road into a creek running parallel to the park. Eventually the water flows into the Blackberry Creek Watershed. Greg agreed to the plan, pending funding.

Tori Trauscht, ILM representative, has written a grant for \$10,000 to fund the Bioswale Project. Dan Nagel, Supervisor Sugar Grove Township, and the PCA President have written letters of endorsement.

Prestbury is expected to make an in-kind contribution by assisting with the planting. The outcome should be known by the end of April.

Streets: On March 24th, The final approval was given to Ridgeline Consulting for street repairs for this year. Invitations to bid went out on March 25th and bids were due back on April 18th. Work will begin around May 1st with a completion date of May 27th.

Streets receiving work this year are Ashwood Court, Birchwood Court, the parking areas in Bury Court, Walnut Circle east between 36 and 17, the cul-de-sac at 131 , and the cul-de-sac across from 21 Walnut Circle. Other work includes a concrete gutter and swale on Windwood Court, and handicap ramp at 12 Heaton Court . Residents on the particular streets will be notified by letter a week in advance of the work

Common Project: Planning continues on the timetable. Planting of trees and perennials, prior to the end of fall rains is of concern.

Invitations to bid on excavation and asphalt are being sent. The project start date is scheduled for August 14th.

Tennis Court: The Courts will open on April 15th. The number for the lock has been changed.

Call the office for the new number. Everyone requesting a number must be registered with a Prestbury Identification Card.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS:

Prestbury entrance at Bliss and Hanks Roads– The only addition to the President’s Bulletin sent earlier is there will be a drainage ditch on both sides of the road, not just the westside as stated earlier.

Swanbroke Easement– The survey and legal description match so that the easement is ready to be signed by all parties.

Clubhouse/Office– The Clubhouse Committee opposes a charge for use of the Clubhouse, stating it is an amenity for the residents. Therefore, there should be no additional charge other than the cleaning fee and security deposit. Laura made a motion based on the Committee’s recommendation. The motion was seconded and carried.

The Clubhouse Committee recommended the security deposit be increased to \$150.00. This would be effective immediately for all new reservations for the clubhouse. The motion to accept this recommendation was passed.

NEW BUSINESS:

Tina DeChaud presented the Vendor Services Job Overview. After discussing the contents, a motion to accept, with one minor change was seconded and passed.

Rules on Childrens Parties at the Cheshire Club were discussed. Laura will investigate the process for handling them and report back to the Board.

Area Interconnecting Bicycle Paths – It was decided it is a beneficial plan, The Board endorsed the plan. A letter containing Prestbury’s suggestions will be sent to the committee.

Vote on the Bees (see Community Comments) was added to the agenda. By a unanimous vote of the Board, it was decided to table indefinitely further consideration of beehives in the area between Manor Hill Place and Green Hills Court.

The meeting was adjourned at 9:15 pm to executive session. The Executive Session adjourned at 9:50 pm and a motion was made to adjourn the meeting at 9:55 pm.

The next meeting of the Prestbury Citizens Association will be May 10, 2011 at 6:30 pm in the Office Building.

Cheshire Clubhouse Rules of Useful Information update, Effective April 13, 2011:

Rental deposit increase- to \$150.00. Please make two individual checks payable to PCA, one for the \$100.00 user fee and one for the security deposit of \$150.00.

Children’s parties- must be reviewed by the Board of Directors prior to acceptance of reservation.

Smoking- is prohibited in the clubhouse. Please follow the Illinois Department of Public Health Smoke – Free Illinois Act 95-0017. Please make

sure guests dispose of smoking materials properly. Smoking receptacles are located in front of the Cheshire Clubhouse between the Clubhouse and the Office building. The second receptacle is located in the rear of the Clubhouse

Loading and un-Loading- Please do not drive or park vehicles on the paver walk-ways.

2011 POOL SEASON:

Opening Day-Saturday, May 28, 2011

Hours-11:00 A.M. to 8:00 P.M. daily, weather permitting.

Children 11 and under must be accompanied by an adult at all times.

Each household will have 4 guest passes for their use for the season. We will keep track of the use of these passes on the pool computer. After the 4 passes are used, the fee per day for guests will be \$5.00 per person. Residents must remain at the pool with their guests at all times.

Family members are not considered guests. Residents must come to the pool and check-in their family members, but do not have to stay at the pool with them. Residents are always responsible for the actions of their family members and guests.

If you wish to have a party at the pool, a form must be completed in the PCA office with Nicki at least a week prior to the party. We ask that parties be held Monday thru Friday between the hours of 4:00 P.M. and 7:00 P.M. If there are 10 or more guests, there will be a charge of \$20.00 per hour for an extra lifeguard. Guest fees also apply.

We will be using the pool card system for admittance to the pool. Cards are REQUIRED for each visit to the pool for anyone over the age of 5. This rule will be strictly enforced. If you require a new card, please see Nicki in the PCA office between the hours of 9:00 A.M. and 2:00 P.M. Monday thru Friday.

Notices regarding swim lessons, water aerobics, and special events will be posted on the bulletin board at the entrance to the pool area and on the Prestbury website.

PCA TREASURER'S Report April 2011

Year 2010

The 2010 audit has been completed and we made a small deficit of \$23k due to the write off of serious delinquents caused by some additional foreclosures. Prestbury has seen a small spike in foreclosures at the end of the financial year, the auditor has recommended that we build back up the provision for bad and doubtful debts to \$25k, which we have done.

A copy of the audited accounts will be available as a photocopy in the office at the end of April 2011.

Delinquents

Please look at the key performance indicators below, we have 16 serious delinquents mainly due to foreclosures and stands at \$25k. Total delinquents have gone up slightly to 3.5% of the total units, from 2.3%.

ARBOR DAY

Friday, April 22, 2011

It has been 135 years since J. Sterling Morton founded Arbor Day. His simple idea of setting aside a special day for tree planting is now more important than ever.
